Highgate Cemetery Work Experience Placement for Harington Students— By Lee Haley, Harington Vocational Trainer

In the new year of 2024, the E3 Horticulture students were chosen by Frank, Head Gardener at Highgate Cemetery, to help manage the woodland estate. Some of the Harington students have been attending Highgate cemetery for work experience.

The students have been helping the grounds team to maintain the 33 acre woodland estate. Each week the students are getting better at the maintenance jobs. The cemetery staff clearly recognise the group as an asset to their team and are sure to give us plenty to do each week.

The staff understand that despite having some learning difficulties, that the students are hard-working, high achieving and so they are valued highly.

All of the staff have really enjoyed supporting the students. Highgate Cemetery is quite a big and scary place, so you can probably imagine that some were a bit nervous at first, but it has been great to see all of the students

overcome their initial fears and now looking forward to going out each week.

Seasonal jobs included leaf collecting, raking, and maintaining hard surfaces and helping to preserve the historic fabric of the cemetery. We are constantly finding interesting and unusual headstones, some belonging to famous or influential people.

Indeed there are plenty of opportunities for hazards within the grounds. We have seen grave-covers that have been prized open by ash tree roots, revealing ten-foot deep chambers beneath. Marble stones are very slippery in wet weather. There are many uneven surfaces, and some sharp materials.

Lead by Frank, all of the grounds team are well trained and well provided for in terms of their PPE and equipment. The students have benefitted enormously from working alongside these seasoned professionals, and have forged good working relationships.

We were very lucky to have a visit to Harington from a large group of 20 Icelandic students on Friday 10th May 2024.

Their visit made for a very interesting cultural exchange at Harington, and a group of Harington students on the Employability course, baked three delicious banana cakes to welcome them to the site.

Afterwards our visitors were taken to view the students' work placement at Highgate Cemetery. The Icelandic group got to see the students working as professionals, while some of the less shy members came forward to chat. Lee Haley, their teacher from Harington, got to talk briefly about training techniques, mainly TSI (Training with systematic instruction), which is driven by earlier practices (Marc Gold "try another way" approach) and philosophy (Wolf Wolfensberger's social role valorisation theory).

The Icelandic group seemed well informed, spoke great English and were not entirely unfamiliar with the practices of which Lee spoke.
